this 1995 work presents an integrated phonetics phonology approach in what has become an established field laboratory phonology

this book has two main goals the re establishment of a rule based phonology as a viable alternative to current non derivational models and the rehabilitation of historical evidence as a focus of phonological theory although lexical phonology includes several constraints such as the derived environment condition and structure preservation intended to reduce abstractness previous versions have not typically exploited these fully the model of lexical phonology presented here imposes the derived environment condition strictly introduces a new constraint on the shape of underlying representations excludes underspecification and suggests an integration of lexical phonology with articulatory phonology

the joint enterprise between research in theoretical linguistics and the acquisition of phonology and morphology is the focus of this volume which provides fresh data from hebrew evaluates old issues and addresses new ones the volume includes articles on segmental phonology vowel harmony and consonant harmony prosodic phonology the prosodic word onsets and codas and phonological errors in spelling it attempts to bridge the gap between phonology and morphology with articles on the development of filler syllables and the effect of phonology on the development of verb inflection it also addresses morphology as well as the development of morphological specification and the assignment of gender in 12 hebrew the data are drawn from typically and atypically developing children using longitudinal and cross sectional experimental methods

generative phonology has many adherents and not a few critics but surprisingly few good expositors françois dell provides here both a general introduction and a detailed illustration of the operation of the theory in practice introducing the main concepts of phonology and its place in the grammar of a language the approach is in the tradition of chomsky and halle emphasizing the interactions between syntax morphology and phonology and aiming at the discovery of general principles which shape the sound patterns of all languages he then applies these concepts to particular case studies on the maxim that the best way to understand a system of this kind is to use it this was first published as part i of les règles et les sons hermann 1973

prosodic phonology by marina nespor and irene vogel is now available again nespor vogel 1986 is a citation classic even after twenty years it is still recognized as the standard resource on prosodic phonology this groundbreaking work introduces all of the prosodic constituents syllable foot word clitic group phonological phrase intonational phrase and utterance and provides evidence for each one from numerous languages prosodic phonology also includes a chapter in which experimental psycholinguistic data support the proposed hierarchy a perceptual study provides evidence that prosodic constituent structure not syntactic constituent structure predicts whether listeners are able to disambiguate different types of ambiguous sentences a chapter on the phonology of poetic meter examines portions of dante s divine comedy it is demonstrated that the constituents proposed for spoken language also make interesting predictions about literary metrical patterns prosodic phonology is an important reference not only for phonologists but for all linguists interested in the issue of interfaces among the components of grammar it is also a basic resource for psycholinguists and cognitive scientists working on linguistic perception and language acquisition

first published in 1991 in this study the author investigates the proper treatment of harmony processes in phonological theory the data examined lead to a formulation of morphologically governed harmony processes which involves multi planar representations the analysis of multi planar harmony leads into a discussion of plane conflation and bracket erasure in lexical phonology this title will be of great interest to students of linguistics

a research perspective that takes language use into account opens up new views of old issues and provides an understanding of issues that linguists have rarely addressed referencing new developments in cognitive and functional linguistics phonetics and connectionist modeling this book investigates various ways in which a speaker hearer s experience with language affects the representation of phonology rather than assuming phonological representations in terms of phonemes joan bybee adopts an exemplar model in which specific tokens of use are stored and categorized phonetically with reference to variables in the context this model allows an account of phonetically gradual sound change which produces lexical variation and provides an explanatory account of the fact that many reductive sound changes affect high frequency items first the well known effects of type and token frequency on morphologically conditioned phonological alterations are shown also to apply to larger sequences such as fixed phrases and constructions solving some of the problems formulated previously as dealing with the phonology syntax interface

this dissertation provides a coherent synchronic broad coverage generative phonology of russian i test the grammar empirically in a number of ways to determine its goodness of fit to russian in taking this approach i aim to avoid making untested or even incoherent generalizations based on only a handful of examples in most cases the tests show that there are exceptions to the theory but at least we know what the exceptions are a baseline is set against which future theories can be measured and in most cases the percentage of exceptional cases is reduced to below 5 the principal theoretical outcomes of the work are as follows first i show that all of the phonological or morphophonological processes reviewed can be described by a grammar no more powerful than context free secondly i exploit probabilistic constraints in the syllable structure grammar to explain why constraints on word marginal onsets and codas are weaker than on word internal onsets and codas i argue that the features initial and final and extraprosodicity are unnecessary for this purpose

in this book richard wiese provides the most complete and up to date description presently available of the phonology of german starting with a presentation of phonemes and their features the author then describes in detail syllables higher prosodic units phonological conditions of word formation patterns of redundancy for features phonological rules and rules of stress for words and phrases giving particular emphasis to the interaction of morphology and phonology he focuses on the present day standard language but includes occasional discussion of other variants and registers the study is informed by recent models in phonological theory and for

phonologists and morphologists it provides both a rich source of material and a critical discussion of current problems and their solutions it also serves as an introduction to the sound system of german for the non specialist reader

this book proposes a new representational analysis of reduplication based on making explicit precedence relations in phonological representations the main claim is that reduplication results from loops in the precedence structure of phonological representations modular rule based analyses of overapplication and underapplication effects including backcopying are presented to argue against the mccarthy and prince 1995 claim that a derivational model of reduplication is conceptually and empirically inadequate other sections of the book discuss the implications of explicit precedence information for the concatenation of morphemes the analysis of infixation and templates in reduplication analyses of relevant phenomena from indonesian tohono oodham chaha chumash and nancowry among other languages are provided

for decades the voicing system of polish has been at the center of a heated theoretical debate concerning laryngeal phonology as it features a number of phenomena that constitute the core of this debate such as final obstruent devoicing regressive voice assimilation and progressive voice assimilation as research into laryngeal phonology progresses on various fronts it becomes more obvious that a large portion of the phenomena in question have phonetic or implementational conditioning thus limiting the role of phonology even further the model presented here is one in which phonology phonetic interpretation and phonetics find their respective homes paradoxically by separating these three levels of description we wish to integrate the disparate threads of modern research of sound patterns into one sound system

the papers collected in this volume apply principles of phonology and morphology to the germanic languages phonological phenomena range from subsegmental over phonemic to prosodic units as syllables pitch accent stress morphology includes properties of roots derivation inflection and words the analyses deal with language internal and comparative aspects covering the whole european range of germanic languages from a theoretical perspective most papers concentrate on constraint based approaches crucial to those theories are principles of the phonology morphology interaction both within and between languages the well documented germanic languages provide an excellent field for research and almost all papers deal with aspects of the interface

this book presents a description of the phonology and morphology of the nominal class system in fula a dialect which displays 21 nominal classes these are identified by suffixes which can attach to nominal verbal and adjectival stems the main objective of this work is to show through a lexical analysis that there are only two monomorphemic marker variants and that the distribution of these variants is predictable

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
